The term swing has broad associations. On the one hand, this means a certain lilting rhythmic style based on the triple division of the rhythm. This propulsion effect was introduced by stride pianists in the 1920s and has been a common feature of jazz for decades. But the swing also means a jazz style that was popular from the around 1930s to the second world war. Swing music was mostly performed by large groups and reached a wide audience through radio, recordings, and dance halls across the country. Before the 1930s, small ensembles, usually made up of trumpets, trombone, clarinet, tubos or bass, banjo or piano and drums, performed jazz. Each instrument had a specific role in the ensemble, and without melody, parts were often improvised. This sectional approach is carried into large swing music bands. But instead of a small ensemble swing in music were three or four trumpeters, three or four trombonists, five saxophonists, who often doubled on clarinets, piano, bassist instead of tubos player, guitarist and drummer. Swing band agreements were mostly made up, often of simple, repetitive material, or reefs that alternate between contrapuntal lines and intense unison rhythms. Improvisation also played an important role, and the soloists will play, and the rest of the band, in addition to the rhythm section, fell out or played on the arranged background lines. One explanation for the popularity of swing music is that its driving intensity and abandonment were a pleasure and freedom at a time when the country was trapped in difficult times. The Great Depression caused Americans to suffer, and dancing to swing music was a way for people to forget their worries. During the 1930s, the swing came to symbolize joy and lightness, the weight of which was reflected in Duke Ellington's piece It Don't Mean a Thing (If It Ain't Got That Swing). Earl Basie: Considered one of the best bandleaders in jazz, Earl Basie has led his orchestra for nearly 50 years. His band was known for playing simple, often blues arrangements, where the focus was on the easy rhythmic ings, the swing aspect that the terrain band sought. Gene Krupa: Krupa rose to fame in the 1930s while playing drums with Benny Goodman's band. He had a flamboyant style, testifying to records like Goodman's Sing, Singing, Singing. He is considered one of the most influential drummers in jazz, not only because of his playing, but also because of his role in standardizing jazz drum technique. Buddy Rich: Rich's powerful and fast drums made him one of the most famous big band drummers. He played with Artie Shaw, Benny Carter and Frank Sinatra. He also led his successful big band in the 1980s, a year after the swing heyday. Freddie Green: Known for defining the role of guitar in a large group setting, Freddie Green enjoyed a 50-year career with Count Basie's orchestra. His style of guitar play was observed due to his harmonic accuracy and manner connected to the drums. Tommy Dorsey: Dorsey's signature lyrical trombone play made his great group one of the most popular during the swing era. Later, movies and radio introduced popular music to even more American houses. Performers related to the original versions of these songs were often portrayed on the cover of music, a side advantage for today's collector as a cross-in to the relic of pop culture. This type of ephemera was so in demand back in its day that many samples sold more than one million copies when they were first issued. Collectors' paper Gene Utz (Collector Books is now out of print, available through second-hand bookstores) reports that Bird Gilded Cage sold two million copies in 1900. In 1910, the familiar tunes Let Me Call You Sweetheart and Down By the Old Mill Stream sold staggering amounts of five to six million copies. Any professional musician of the day would stack a colorful sheet of music stashed on piano benches and clinging to boxes. Amateur musicians patronized traders selling sheet music so that they would be used for entertainment at home, especially during the holidays. The faces of early 20th century personalities such as Al Jolson, Fannie Brice and Eddie Cantor have been caught up in many early sheet music issues. Later in the 1940s, stars such as Bing Crosby and Dorothy Lamour impressed fans with colourfully illustrated covers. Even sheet music from the Beatles, Beach Boys and other newer issues featuring pop culture icons, such as Michael Jackson, is being collected today. More recognizable stars and songs usually have the most value with a few exceptions teen or attractive cover illustrations. Competition is not particularly fierce Ephemera because there are many song titles to go around, but there are some crossover collection cases when it comes to sheet music. For example, military theme cuts are often of interest to militaria collectors, also known as military collectors. Broadway music enthusiasts will also look for numerous titles from Rodgers and Hammerstein or Irving Berlin.
